Jaguar Land Rover is losing £4m a day - can it turn things around?

CEO Ralf Speth has pledged the company will return to profitability by the end of the financial year Jaguar Land Rover announced a loss of £395m for the second quarter of the year on Thursday - which means the Coventry car maker has been losing more than £4m a day. As the company continues to chart a path through choppy waters it has faced a number of challenges, including slowing sales in China, declining demand for diesel vehicles and uncertainty over Brexit. Despite the difficult times it is enduring, Jaguar Land Rover's CEO Ralf Speth has pledged the company will return to profitability by the end of the current financial year. Announcing the £395m quarterly loss for the period from April to the end

of June, the company said there were some encouraging signs in the shape of record UK sales, which were up 2.6 per cent year-on-year for the period. Another ray of hope was a rise in sales in China in June. CoventryLive has spoken to former Land Rover chief engineer Dr Charles Tennant, now a respected automotive industry analyst, as to what the latest figures mean for the company going forward. Mr Tennant said Jaguar Land Rover was going through "worrying times" but seemed to be "on the right path" with its electric vehicle plans. He also said that given the global headwinds impacting on the automotive industry the prospect of a takeover by high-flying French car giant PSA



Group was still potentially on the horizon. Here's what Charles Tennant had to say on the state of the company. "Jaguar Land Rover sales for the April to June quarter slumped 12 per cent to 129,000 vehicles and it lost a massive £395m, even though they are in the midst of a huge £2.5 billion cost saving programme. This comes after a major credit ratings downgrade forced them to take a bailout from the UK government, in the form of a £500m loan guarantee to help fund its vehicle electrification plans. The losses have also caused the company to swing to a negative cash flow of £719m and throttle back investment by £271m to £795m in the quarter. Amongst this bleak turmoil the only bright spot was the UK market which saw an upswing in sales of 2.6% but all other markets were down. Worryingly Europe was 9.3% down and China a whopping 29.2% both being much worse than the industry average. Sales were depressed across all of the vehicle range with the worst performers being the Jaguar XF, Land Rover Discovery & Discovery Sport, and Jaguar F-Pace. The Range Rover models fared little better although the electric Jaguar I-Pace saw a big upswing in sales.

So at least it would appear that JLR is now on the right path with plans to produce more electric vehicles, but this will come at a high cost in lean times, so I fear more debt will be loaded onto the company's balance sheet to fund this. These are worrying times for JLR as their owner Tata Motors is also struggling with losses in a rapidly slowing Indian car market and a share price that has tanked this year. Obviously JLR has suffered more than most with the diesel decline and is working hard on its collaboration with BMW on alternative gasoline engines and electrification plans, but it has other problems. The company has a complicated and overlapping vehicle range, which has caused a phenomenon known as sales cannibalisation, where similar vehicles across JLR simply compete for the same customers. Also it is hampered by poor quality and reliability as evident by coming last in the recent influential JD Power survey in America, warranty expenses at an all time high of 3.9% of revenue, and brand image damaging product recalls in China."

Are you worried about Jaguar Land Rover's future? "Yes. It's going through a tough time and it faces some serious challenges to turn things around. It has come through tough times before and will do so again. Whilst it is true that other premium and luxury vehicle manufacturers such as Daimler and BMW have also taken a hit on profits, they are much bigger companies more able to weather the storm than JLR. And meanwhile the French group PSA (Peugeot/Citroen/Opel/Vauxhall) is being touted as the turnaround king by Forbes for producing German style premium sector profit margins from its mass market cars and SUVs. It is now sitting on a cash pile and is looking for further acquisitions to grow its business further – could that be JLR in the not too distant future?"

Jaguar Land Rover granted £500 million loan guarantee by UK government

Having committed to building electric vehicles in Castle Bromwich, the British carmaker will have a £500 million loan guaranteed by the UK Government.. Jaguar Land Rover (JLR) has secured a £500 million (\$884 million) loan guarantee from the British Government, having last week announced plans to build its next-generation electric vehicles in the UK. The guarantee was made by the UK Export Finance agency, and is designed to give the struggling carmaker a leg-up in the race to develop electric vehicles. Theresa May announced the guarantee at a round-table meeting of carmakers at Downing Street in London. The British Prime Minister laid out plans to boost electric vehicle adoption, including a plan to make England the first country to make electric charging points mandatory in new homes. Last week, Jaguar Land Rover announced it will make the next-generation XJ a pure-electric sedan, and committed to re-tooling the Castle Bromwich factory to create the "UK's first premium electrified vehicle plant". It's a move that will preserve at least 2500 jobs in Britain, according to the company. The same factory recently voted to move to a four-day week as Jaguar Land Rover looks to slash costs. To support its new electric plans, Jaguar Land Rover called for the British government and industry to invest in 'giga-scale battery production' to 'support and grow' the existing vehicle supply chain.

Jaguar Land Rover Ratings Cut Again, But Profit Turnaround Expected

Financially troubled maker of luxury SUVs and sports cars Jaguar Land Rover (JLR) has been boosted recently by its decision to accelerate electric car production, and a \$626 million loan guarantee from the British government. But British-based and Tata Motors of India owned JLR was reminded of reality Tuesday when Fitch Ratings downgraded some of its debt, citing

weakening markets, high investment spending requirements, the prospect of a "disorderly" Brexit, and worries about tariff wars. Fitch said JLR is the most exposed premium manufacturer to a Brexit which doesn't include an agreed plan between the EU and Britain. But it also said current JLR losses will turn into small profits next year, and larger ones by 2022. This comes after Moody's Investors Service downgraded some of JLR's debt in June because of its continuing troubles in China, and similar worries about the huge amount of capital required to fund electrification. JLR reported a loss of \$4.6 billion for its financial year ended March 31. JLR has said it was cutting 4,500 jobs as part of a turnaround policy. In November last year JLR announced a plan, "Charge and Accelerate", to slash \$3.2 billion in costs over the next 18 months. Fitch said JLR is handicapped by its small size compared with the competition from Mercedes, BMW and Audi.

"JLR's business risk profile is negatively affected by its small scale relative to investment grade auto manufacturers as well as its high operating leverage. JLR's margins and cash flow were sharply affected by declining sales in China and Europe," Fitch said in a report. "Countering the sales slowdown over the last twelve months has been cost reductions in U.K. manufacturing and the move to lower cost manufacturing in Slovakia to support new model lines. Fitch expects volumes to remain relatively flat for the 2020 financial year as it forecasts negative sales growth in Europe and flat sales in China," the report said. Fitch expects JLR's EBIT (earnings before interest and tax) margin to recover to between 1%-2% in financial years 2020 and 2021, from negative 1.8%, excluding write-downs, in the financial year ended March 31. "We expect the EBIT margin to increase to 4% in financial 2022 as the effect of higher margin model launches is felt," Fitch said. In the report, Fitch reckoned JLR's plans would start to work in a couple of years. "We expect investment spending to remain high at between (\$4.4 billion-\$5.0 billion) from financial years 2020 through 2022. Fitch expects investment in new models, such as the Defender and Range Rover replacements, to bolster revenue and profitability in financial 2021 and 2022. JLR's investments in electric drive-train and battery plants should protect the company from capacity constraints in electric vehicle production, and ensure the supply chain remains under JLR's control for future production," the report said. Fitch said JLR's over-reliance on diesel power is being corrected and accounted for 71% of sales in the last financial year, down from over 90% the previous year. "This could be reduced by JLR's plans to offer the option of electrification on all of its vehicles from 2020. JLR's early introduction of PHEV (plug-in hybrid electric vehicle) technology has improved sales of its high-end SUVs compared to its rivals," the report said.

BMW and Jaguar Land Rover to share engines

In June JLR and BMW announced a plan to collaborate on developing electric motors and transmissions.

BMW and Jaguar Land Rover are reportedly set to share petrol, diesel and hybrid powertrains in a bid to save money. British publication Autocar reports that the two companies will extend their recently announced partnership on electric vehicles to include internal combustion engines. BMW will provide Jaguar Land Rover with four- and six-cylinder petrol and diesel engines, and mild-hybrid versions of both for a range of vehicles. While the deal hasn't been officially announced, it will be a win-win for both companies. Jaguar Land Rover is under pressure amid declining sales while simultaneously needing to invest in developing a new range of electric vehicles, including an electric sedan that will replace the now defunct XJ. BMW will be able to amortise its investment in the next generation of internal combustion engines at a time when increasingly tighter emissions add to development costs. Partnerships are becoming more popular in the car industry as carmakers look to maximise the return on investment, especially with the increase in demand for electric vehicles. In recent months, Ford has taken a \$500 million stake in electric ute/SUV brand Rivian, and just last week expanded its partnership with Volkswagen for EV passenger cars. It's not just EVs though, with Toyota famously partnering with BMW for the new Supra/Z4 and Subaru for the 86/BRZ sports cars.

Tata Motors-owned Jaguar Land Rover sees weaker US sales for second month

Luxury carmaker Jaguar Land Rover posted its second straight monthly sales decline in U.S., adding to the worries of parent Tata Motors. Jaguar Land Rover sold 8,485 cars and SUVs across North America in June, down 9% from the year-earlier period, it said in a statement. Sales volumes of Land Rover fell 6% on-year to 6,593 vehicles, while that of Jaguar slumped 20%. "After setting record sales in previous years, we are beginning to see the industry soften," said Joe Eberhardt, president and chief executive of JLR North America. "But we are confident that with our robust product offering, we are in a position to maintain our sales momentum." Automobile sales in the U.S. showed a mixed trend last month, with SUVs continuing to draw consumer interest, while passenger cars further sliding, Reuters reported. Car sales have been hit by high interest rates while a number of cars coming off vehicle leases also damped demand, it added. JLR's weak monthly sales in the U.S. also comes in the backdrop of simmering problems at the British car maker, which has been witnessing a slowing demand in major markets, especially in China. JLR accounts for almost half of the Mumbai-based Tata Motors' unit sales and 75% of its total revenue. After years of good growth, JLR's retail volume growth in China turned negative in May 2018 and has been declining at high double-digit rates since last July. The marguee brand is also facing weakness from a demand slowdown in Europe and the U.K., hit by tougher emission rules, as well as the company's new electrification plans. The company said it will introduce a portfolio of electrified products across its model range in the coming years, embracing fully electric, plug-in hybrid, and mild hybrid vehicles, as well as continue to offer ultra-clean gasoline and diesel engines. Lower incentives offered by the automaker also hurt demand. Incentives at JLR dropped 20% sequentially, Nomura said, adding that Jaguar saw a 10% decline, while Land Rover posted a 28% slump. Higher incentives at other luxury rivals Mercedes Benz, BMW, and Audi helped improve their monthly sales volumes in June. Nomura expects JLR's sales volume to grow 6% in this fiscal year, led by the launch of new Range Rover Evoque variants and a new Defender.

The troubles at JLR last month prompted Moody's Investors Service to downgrade credit ratings of Tata Motors and JLR. The slump in demand had, earlier this year, forced JLR to cut 10% of its workforce and revamp its operations. In February, Tata Motors posted its biggest loss in India's corporate history of \$4 billion due to an impairment at JLR.

In April, the company said it expects JLR to eventually return to profitability on the back of cost cuts and a recovery in Chinese demand. But it warned that the cash flow for JLR would be negative till fiscal 2021.

Tata Motors rose 1.8% in Mumbai trading on Thursday, while the benchmark S&P BSE Sensex ended 0.2% higher.

Jaguar Land Rover reports best ever July sales in US

Jaguar Land Rover (JLR) has released its July sales performance in the US: Land Rover sales were up 4% year-on-year at 6,456 units; Jaguar sales were 2,020 units, a 7% increase. Total July sales in the US reached 8,476 units, a 5% increase from in July 2018. For the calendar year, JLR achieved 70,881 units, an increase of 5% vs. 67,655 in 2018.

These figures follow worrying first quarter results for JLR published last week that revealed a £395 million pre-tax loss, widening from the £264 million loss in the same period last year. "We are proud to end the month with an increase in sales across both Jaguar and Land Rover," said Joe Eberhardt, president and CEO, JLR North America. With the industry experiencing significant headwinds, we remain confident that our award-winning SUV product offering, supported by our dedicated retailer network, will continue this sales momentum." Land Rover sales were driven by the Range Rover lineup. The new Range Rover Evoque is up 38% with 876 units sold. The Range Rover Sport continues to be the brand's sales leader with 1,748 units sold. The Range Rover is up 20% with 1,307 units sold. In the US, the 2019/2020 Land Rover model line-up features six models; two within the Discovery family, and four within the Range Rover Family.

Tata Motors eyes partnerships for Jaguar Land Rover


Tata Motors is looking to establish partnerships for its Jaguar Land Rover subsidiary, in light of the British outfit's volume slowdown and increasing losses. This was revealed by Natarajan Chandrasekaran, chairman of Tata Motors, at the company's 74th annual general meeting, as reported by Financial Express. According to JLR's financial results for the three-month period ending June 30, 2019, the company recorded a year-on-year 11.6% decline in its global retail sales to 128,615 vehicles for the quarter. It also reported a pre-tax loss of 395 million British pounds, which was higher than the loss of 264 million British pounds loss in the same period last year, on quarterly revenues that declined 2.8% year-on-year to 5.07 billion British pounds. Chandrasekaran described the automotive sector as both capital and investment intensive, especially to develop new products and technology. "The only way to handle the ongoing crisis and the continuing need for large capital expenditure is additional investment through partnerships, because we want to spread the investment, which cannot be shut either," said Chandrasekaran. "There are many discussions from tactical to strategic for such partnerships. Opportunities are coming and we keep evaluating them and as long as it is in the interest of Tata Motors. We will forge such partnerships so that we are able to address the capital expenditure issue," he added. The uncertainty that arises from the Brexit issue is also detrimental to JLR, as it affects the company's ability to procure parts. "The real concern is if Brexit were to happen with or without a deal, what will be the impact on our supply chain. We import millions of components from other parts of the world, particularly Europe," explained Chandrasekaran. In the situation of Brexit, there's a possibility of a supply chain breakdown, which essentially means production cannot happen, inventories are to be maintained," he continued. For now, Chandrasekaran stated the company has yet to narrow down any potential partners, but will continue meeting with multiple players, including in China, to find a suitable fit for JLR.

Land Rover driver grandad, 89, 'would rather go to prison than pay £160 parking fine'

Roger Murray has now been threatened with bailiffs if he doesn't pay. An 89-year-old from the Midlands has vowed to go to jail rather than pay a parking fine. The pensioner made the claim after he was fined £160. He claims he was fined over parking his vehicle, which is a Land Rover, "just over the line" in a car park. Now, the grandfather says he will go to prison rather than fork out the money. Roger Murray has now been threatened with bailiffs if he doesn't pay. He was initially handed a £50 penalty for 'untidy parking' in May. The 89-year-old made an appeal, insisting he parked as close to the wall as possible, while allowing his passenger access to leave the vehicle. But Cheshire East Council rejected his claim that the space was too small for his 4x4. Officials said Roger could have parked at other spaces that were large enough for his vehicle. He refused to

pay the fine so it has now increased to £158, and bailiffs are threatening to come and seize his possessions.

The latest fine charge includes any costs bailiffs' incurred on their visit. Roger, who has two daughters and two grandchildren, told Cheshire Live "I dare not leave home now as they could turn up at any time it's frightening. "I probably should have paid the fine but for a trivial offence of untidy parking this is over the top. "The council is partly at fault as their allocated spaces are to much too small. "The old Defender is not a big vehicle in this day and age, tall maybe, but not as wide as today's SUVs. "I am so incensed, the council should show more compassion. I'll get the barricades up and wait for them, I'd rather go to prison than pay the fine, it's totally wrong." The incident happened at the Grosvenor multi-storey, in Macclesfield town centre. Roger, from Cheshire, even returned to the



parking space and took a picture of his Land Rover in it to prove the bay was too small. He has shared his story on Face-book, where it has attracted hundreds of supportive comments. Upon refusing Roger's appeal and then the fine not being paid Cheshire East Council passed the matter on to bailiffs. A council spokesman said: "Every penalty charge notice (PCN) issued is supported by a range of evidence, including a photographic record. In this case, the PCN was issued correctly. Regulations state that a vehicle must be parked within the marked bays. In this case, the vehicle was positioned in a way that prevented other drivers from using the neighbouring parking space. The car park in question has some bays that are noticeably smaller and are marked up to warn drivers of this fact. It also has areas on certain floors that can accommodate the wider vehicle. When any PCN is issued we offer a number of opportunities for the driver to pay and the driver is given very clear notice of the consequences and timeline of what happens if they do not pay. We only engage debt recovery enforcement agents following continued requests for payments being refused or ignored. We pursue PCNs to protect the public purse. We do not seek to intimidate residents or service users."

Jaguar Land Rover to help tackle plastic waste problem

Jaguar Land Rover is trialing an innovative recycling process, which converts plastic waste into a new premium-grade material that could feature on future vehicles. It is estimated that the amount of plastic waste is predicted to exceed 12 million tons globally by 2050. Today, not all of this plastic can be recycled for use in automotive applications — especially in vehicle parts that are required to meet the most exacting safety and quality standards.

Working in conjunction with chemical company BASF, Jaguar Land Rover is part of a pilot project called ChemCycling that upcycles domestic plastic waste, otherwise destined for landfill or incinerators, into a new high-quality material. The plastic waste is transformed to pyrolysis oil using a thermochemical process. This secondary raw material is then fed into BASF's production chain as a replacement for fossil resources, ultimately producing a new premium grade that replicates the high quality and performance of "virgin" plastics. It can be tempered and colored making it the ideal sustainable solution for designing the next-generation dashboards and exterior surfaces in Jaguar and Land Rover models.

Jaguar Land Rover and BASF are currently testing the pilot phase material in a Jaguar I-Pace prototype front-end carrier

overmolding to verify it meets the same safety requirements of the existing original part. Chris Brown, senior sustainability manager at Jaguar Land Rover, said: "Plastics are vital to car manufacturing and have proven benefits during their use phase, however, plastic waste remains a major global challenge. Solving this issue requires innovation and joined-up thinking between regulators, manufacturers and suppliers. "At Jaguar Land Rover, we are proactively increasing recycled content in our products, removing single-use plastics across our operations and reducing excess waste across the product lifecycle. The collaboration with BASF is just one way in which we are advancing our commitment to operating in a circular economy."



2020 LAND ROVER DEFENDER ON SHOW AT GOODWOOD

The 2020 Land Rover Defender Was Driven Up The Famous Hillclimb At The Goodwood Festival Of Speed Across The Weekend Giving A Glimpse Of The New Off-Roader. The 2020 Land Rover Defender will be revealed in full at the Frankfurt

Motor Show in September, but attendees at the Goodwood Festival of Speed were given a glimpse of a camouflaged Defender. The prototype Defender was driven up the famous hilclimb track at Goodwood by the Duke of Richmond (pictured).

The Duke of Richmond said, "Few vehicles in the world can claim to be an icon, but that's the only way to describe the Land Rover Defender. It's extremely close to my heart and a vehicle that I've had a close connection with over the decades, so to be able to open this year's Festival of Speed by driving it up the Hill was a real privilege".

Land Rover displayed a replica (read: one that didn't give too much away) of the Defender that was recently used by the Tusk Foundation in Africa as part of the Defender's final field test.








Red Cross tests new Land Rover Defender in the desert

The new Land Rover Defender is imminent and, like its predecessor, will be put to work for many public and emergency services, as well as overseas charities. After pushing it to the limit in the desert, the Red Cross has already signed a three-year deal with Land Rover. The Red Cross threw the new Defender headlong at the harsh desert environment. Steep ascents, soft sand and temperatures exceeding 40 degrees centigrade were a real challenge. They also took it on-road to assess refinement and comfort, along the Jebel Jais highway and up to 2,000 metres above sea level. Prototypes have covered more than 750,000 miles in the world's harshest environments. This included a spell in Africa with the wildlife conservation charity Tusk, working with Lions. The Dubai excursion with the Red Cross is the latest in a long and gruelling programme. Land Rover wants to make sure the new Defender is worthy of the name. "Jaguar Land Rover is proud to support the work of the IFRC," said Nick Rogers, executive director of product engineering at JLR. "Since 1954, our vehicles have enabled access to remote

and vulnerable communities, helping them become more resilient, and we hope the new Defender will maintain this heritage. The dunes of Dubai are the perfect place to confirm that this is the most capable Land Rover ever made." The work began with a visit to the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) global fleet base in Dubai. Land Rover's relationship with the IFRC goes back 65 years. That relationship continues as the two go into a three-year global partnership focused on disaster preparedness. 

Land Rover Clubs Liaison Meeting.

Hello Presidents and Club Reps,

As previously advised, I met with James Scrimshaw, of Jaguar Land Rover Australia, on Tuesday, 18th June, at their HQ building at Mascot, in Sydney.

Items of general interest discussed included:

- *Difficult sales environment worldwide (especially China) although North America good.
- *Some redundancies at JLR worldwide including Australia. JLR A is now doing more with less.
- *Demand for diesel vehicles low especially in Europe. Now seeing this trend in Australia. JLR is moving to offer more electric power trains, including pure electric (such as Jaguar I-Pace), plug in hybrid (Range Rover Sport PHEV) and 48V mild hybrid (new Range Rover Evoque).
- *Longer term Demise of diesel may not suit Australian users. Unfortunately, Australian market not big enough to support ongoing worldwide manufacture of diesel.
- *New Defender to released in first week of September. Will be a huge media launch. James looking forward to comparison tests with other off road oriented vehicles, as it will do very well. Expect Defender to be available in 90 and 110 models and will have many historic Defender styling cues.

*The marketplace is changing and JLR needs to meet the tastes of a younger population. Example – Many younger customers will not buy leather upholstery. (Due to vegan tastes, do not support using animal products, etc.). Land Rover have developed an upholstery fabric incorporating recycled plastic as a substitute which is doing well.

Items raised by Clubs:

*I had a query from the TeamW4 Club of Western Australia with regard to having their club included in the listing of Land Rover clubs provided to new car buyers. In the past, a hard copy customer brochure, listing all LR clubs in Australia, was part of the sales package dealers provided with to new car buyers. (I received one when I bought my new Discovery some years ago.)

*James said JLR had moved away from hard copy brochures and now made that information available online. However, the Australian Land Rover clubs listing has not been replicated online so there is no list of clubs currently available. By way of explanation, online information is now managed centrally from the UK so it has become more difficult to have local data includ-

ed. James will look into what can be done and advise.
*I had not received any further items or responses from other clubs.

Trip Report – Donnelly's Creek area 16th June 2019.

Dave must have a direct link to the "powers that be" because the day was fine and generally sunny: all wet weather gear remained stowed. We met in 3°C at Walhalla's southern car park area, and after a few quick pit stops set off north through Walhalla at 09:50 hrs. Trip leader observed the 30 kmh limit through Walhalla, so fines will not be forthcoming. The Perentie then set a cracking pace but was always brought back to the pack because he had to await the slower convoy body to catch-up each time he had to mark a turn. A right turn onto Binns Rd and along to the helipad for morning coffee and personal refuelling (4°C). Off once more we finally caught the Perentie at the left turn onto McEvoys Track (aka. Springs Rd). We saw several examples of the work done by Rudi Paoletti and his helpers who have installed many signs and information panels here and elsewhere in the district. Past the Dawes Hotel, Bark Hut Boarding House and The Springs sites before turning left onto Donnelly's Creek Rd for a quick stop at the Edwards Reef Burial Ground which was established in 1863.

This burial ground was not gazetted as a cemetery but served the Edwards Reef Township (pop about 300) for over 20 years. Recent bushfires cleared the undergrowth, exposing several "lost" graves which are now clearly visible and marked out with white stones. All official records were lost in the 1939 bush fires so only some 19 people are now confirmed as having been buried there. The grave of Christina Shaw is marked by a wrought iron bedhead and a copper plate on which her name and particulars have been detailed in Gaelic. The plate was placed on the grave in 1930 by Christina's son, Alexander.

Next a quick stop to look at a lone burial plot of 5 year old Eliza Alderson at the site of the Edwards Reef Township.

There were several campers packing up at the Store Point Township site as we passed on the way to O'Tooles Flat camp ground for lunch. Conversation and lunch with Tonee's
